# Hot Day, Cold Soup

Recipe inspired by soup from *Loaves & Fishes*Soup preparation and review by APD Board Member Christine Metz

#### **Summer Borscht**

Ingredients:

5 medium fresh beets (two pounds without tops)
2 cups low-sodium chicken stock
16 ounces sour cream
½ cup plain yogurt
¼ cup sugar

2 tblsps. lemon juice
2 tsps. champagne vinegar
1½ tsps. ground pepper
2 cups medium diced English cucumber, seeded
½ cup chopped scallions
2 tblsps. chopped fresh dill

Directions:

Place the beets in a large pot of boiling water and cook uncovered until the beets are tender, 30 to 40 minutes. Remove the beets to a bowl using a slotted spoon and set aside to cool. Strain the cooking liquid and set aside to cool.

In a large bowl, whisk together 1½ cups of the beet cooking liquid, the chicken stock, sour cream, yogurt, sugar, lemon juice, vinegar, 1 tablespoon salt, and the ground pepper. Peel the cooled beets and cut them in a medium dice. Add the beets, cucumber, scallions, and dill to the soup. Cover and chill for at least 4 hours or overnight.

Enjoy this colorful, cold soup with a dollop of sour cream and a sprig of dill!

Soup can be a great go-to meal when you want something light and satisfying. But with temperatures over 90 degrees, it's less enticing to prepare and eat a hot bowl of soup. So, why not try whipping up a cold soup for a summer meal or two? I suggest this classic summer borscht, a tasty cold beet soup.

In addition to working at Merica House, Saudatu is a student in the Northern Virginia Community College nursing program.

In November 2023, Saudatu returned to Sierra Leone to marry her long-time boyfriend. The couple first met as students in 2007. Saudatu's husband is a successful computer programmer in Sierra Leone. Their plans for the future are uncertain. Saudatu may decide to return to Sierra Leone once she completes her nursing studies, or her husband may decide to come to the United States. However the future unfolds, Saudatu and her husband are both anxious to live together as husband and wife in the very near future.


# Welcome To Our World

This issue, we are staying closer to home. We thought readers might enjoy a tour of some of the establishments that populate our neighborhood.

We begin our tour at Five Guys Hamburgers, because no one should ever travel on an empty stomach. "Five Guys" is a misnomer. There are actually six guys: Jerry Murrell, the patriarch of the family, and his five sons: Jim, Matt, Chad, Ben and Tyler.

Tyler was a late arrival, joining the family after the "Five Guys" brand had already been trademarked. Five Guys is unique in the food industry; the company does





not engage in paid advertising. The annual advertising budget for Five Guys and its franchisees is literally zero. The Murrell family believes that serving good burgers and showering customers with free peanuts is the best mode of advertising. From Five Guys, we travel west a slight distance to the local FedEx Office print shop. We like the customer service reps at FedEx Office because they are avid college basketball fans — and also because they help us produce this newsletter.

Proceeding east from FedEx Office, we pass the Calvary Baptist Church. Calvary Baptist has been a fixture in Northern Virginia for 60 years and is known for its children's choral



group. Moving on past Calvary Baptist, we head south for a short stretch to reach the Alexandria campus of Northern Virginia Community College. It is a beautiful campus — a view that we enjoy from our TV room after autumn has stripped



the trees of their leaves. Passing the campus, we proceed west to reach Coca Cola's Northern Virginia distribution center. Oops, it turns out that the Coca Cola security guards get a bit nervous when unknown individuals take pictures of the facility.
